TEEN STRUGGLES & MENTAL HEALTH

Neurodivergent is a term used to describe a person whose brain is built differently enough to affect their day-to-day life. There are quite a few disorders that fit under this category, including Autism Spectrum Disorder, ADHD, Down Syndrome, and Dyslexia. Being neurodivergent has no cure at the moment. This, combined with the fact that accommodations are difficult to get in the first place, makes living a 'normal' life exceedingly difficult for people under the neurodivergent umbrella.

I am neurodivergent myself. Even on a good day, my symptoms can be nearly debilitating at some points. My brain sees and processes the world in a vastly different way than the average person. For me, my senses are constantly heightened. This can leave me burnt out after doing simple things like going to school or taking the dog out. It is also a struggle to keep my emotions regulated, and I often have a hard time in social situations. I have trouble reading body language and social cues from my peers. My brain takes a few extra seconds to process the sounds and sights around me. My sensory needs are higher than most, which also heavily restricts my diet. All of these things combined can make each day a struggle.

There are many negative stereotypes surrounding being neurodivergent. Most kids with these disorders are ostracized by their peers, as studies show that neurotypical people (people who aren't neurodivergent) can subconsciously tell whether or not someone is autistic in seconds. Neurodivergent children are more likely to be bullied and consequently traumatized due to their disorder. Suicide rates for people with autism are higher than those without, with males being 3 times more likely to commit suicide than their neurotypical peers.


